In the beginning.....

The embryo of the "Lakeside Poincianas" lay more or less in the mind of Mary Teommey for perhaps as long as a year. During that time she brought up the subject occassionally, but it got no further than the discussion stage.

On May 14, 1969, there was held in the recreation area a swim party and breakfast. It was at this gathering that the seed was finally planted in fertile ground.

In the pool with Mary Toemmey were Sara Prince, Valentine Anderson, Virginia Garvin, Agnes Helman, Ina Mayer and Sally Lomicka. Within this group were some of the most active, resourceful and imaginative women living in Lakeside Point Gardens. When Mary brought up the subject of a women's organization to them, a lively discussion ensued. Before the discussion ended, Ina Mayer had been selected to assume the responsibility of getting the organization in motion. All of those present helped in one way or another.

Notices were posted at each building announcing a meeting at the clubhouse on the evening of May 21, 1969, for the purpose of discussing the organizing of a Lakeside Point Women's Club. More than fifty women attended, most of whom were heartily in favor of the proposal. Officers were elected and building representatives and committee chairmen appointed.

What the club should be named was discussed and several suggestions were offered. Each of those present was asked to submit, in writing, her preference of a name. At a meeting of all the officers and committee chairmen on June 10, 1969, at Ina Mayer's, our first president, the votes for the various names were counted. "Lakeside Poincianas" was preferred by a large majority. It was considered an interesting play on words.

It has been the aim of the organization to make some major contributions to our development each year.

Ina Mayer's term was most memorable for the cementing of the Poincianas into a well-functioning group, and accumulating funds toward the purchase of a much-needed piano for the clubhouse.

Mary Teommey's term in office was the realization of acquiring the piano in 1971. The club also purchased a coatrack for

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the clubhouse and took the initiative in acquiring a flagpole for the recreation area.

Gladys Bourne, our third president, saw the installation of venetian blinds in the clubhouse card room and at the close of her term, two hundred dollars was put in escrow toward the purchase of new draperies for the clubhouse.

The 1971-72 term was filled by Maybelle Prather. At the end of that term, there was much satisfaction derived from the acquisition of new draperies for the clubhouse. This was accomplished through the cooperation of the Craft Group. Each organization contributed \$600. toward this purchase. It should be noted that in 1971 Bernice Crosby presented the Poincianas with a lovely tea service in memory of her daughter. It has been appropriately inscribed so that the source of this generous contribution will not be forgotten.

Clarice Bardsley, Poincianas' fifth president, was prevailed upon to serve two terms in office. During her second term, carpeting and flatware were purchased.

During Dorothy Wolner's term as president, we had storage cabinets installed in the south end of the clubroom and painting were purchased.

The Poincianas have always contributed to charities. Since the first year of its existence, a Christmas contribution to the "Empty Stocking Fund" has been made. For the past several years an additional larger project has been undertaken. One popular project has been the collecting of staple foods for the migrant farm workers, and gifts for the children of these workers. For a period, a group of our women who sew made over men's old shirts into hospital gowns for the county home.

In 1973, the Poincianas undertook the chore of compiling a directory for the Lakeside Point Condominiums. The work and cost of this project was borne entirely by the organization.

Marie Von Stetina was handed the president's gavel in 1977. That year started the tradition of Christmas Open House for the entire condominium community. Also, a Hawaiian-type dinner and splash party and brunch was held. The major accomplishment in 1973 was the remodeling of the kitchen in the clubhouse. The most memorable evening was the result of the talent of Mary Lou Byerly who presented a program of clothing fashions from the year 1850 to 2000, modeled by members of the Poincianas.

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Marie Baconet wore Mary Lou Byerly's grandmother's outfit from 1850. Mary Lou Byerly wore an outfit belonging to her aunt from 1910.

Dorothy Wolner, Dorothy Mann and Gladys Bourne in matching black and white outfits and straw hats sang "I was strolling Through the Park One Day."

Vi Waterhouse dressed as a flapper of the '20's. Ina Mayer wore her own wedding dress of 1930. Jean and Larry Fulmer wore coordinating outfits and became the 1950 jitterbuggers.

Maybelle Prather stole the show as the 1930's Enemy No. 1, Dillinger. Sylvia Lindfors was a 1960 hippie; Lena LaPerle was a 1970 "sexpot."

Clarice Bardsley and Marie Von Stetina wore evening gowns from 1960. Val Stokes closed the program representing the electronic woman of 2000.

Ruth Hughes, president during 1978-79, saw the following contributions to Lakeside Point Community:

- 1 - Compiling and distributing new directories for our condominiums.
- 2 - Purchase of 2 new umbrellas for poolside tables.
- 3 - Purchase of 4 new chairs for poolside.
- 4 - Painting of exterior of clubhouse.

Val Stokes became president in 1979. A hot dog lunch (\$1.00 per person) and spaghetti dinner were among the money-making events. Once again, Mary Lou Byerly demonstrated her abilities and capabilities in the creation of the program for Feb. 26, 1980. She assembled the talent from among the membership and wrote the script for the skit.

Mary Lou Byerly introduced the program wearing a flashy, red, white and blue outfit, mustache and straw hat.

Irene Bartose and Dorothy Slattery did a song and dance number; Al Janssen was a great Al Jolson. A humorous skit was presented starring Maybelle Prather as the grouchy school teacher and Vi Waterhouse, Lena LaPerle, Sylvia Lindfors and Kip Taylor as the rotten school children.

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In 1981, no one was found who was willing to serve as president. Three ladies agreed to share the responsibility for the year - Vivian Gray, Margaret Roof and Sally Prather. The one money maker of the year was a luncheon and style show which was very successful.

On March 27, 1984, during the presidency of Peggie Paustion, Mary Lou Byerly shared her creative talents once more in the form of a fashion show to end all fashion shows. The hilarity started even before the program did when President Paustion by a "slip of the tongue" announced that the program would be a "passion" show.

The program opened with Mary Lou Byerly, the French fashion expert. She wore white slacks, a navy blazer, a beret, a mustache and, to the enjoyment of all, a very hairy chest which she proudly displayed to all. Mary Lou introduced each of the models and described their outfits.

The first model was Kit Roche, labeled "Miss Striker." Her checkered pants displayed numerous cancelled checks sewn onto the slacks. Her T shirt was adorned with many golf tees and she swung a golf club with abandon. She was a genuine sports' woman and her number was accompanied by "Take Me Out To The Ball Game."

Bee Kelleher appeared second as "Miss Classy" accompanied by Dorothy Wolner on the piano with "Ain't She Sweet!" One of the outstanding features of Bee's outfit was the "pencil stripe" dress. The stripes were actually rows of pencils sewn onto the dress.

Number three was "Miss Look Well" modeled by Maybelle Prather. Her "scoop neck" blouse displayed a genuine sugar scoop fastened in the front and back. The "tea dress" boasted many tea bags sewn around the bottom. The "Can Can" skirt was adorned with orange juice cans around the bottom. The climax of her costume came when she displayed voluminous bloomers with a huge "Hi" on the seat. Spaghetti straps consisted of real spaghetti taped to the blouse. Miss Look Well's parade was accompanied by "Ta Ra Ra Boom Te Aye" on the piano

Also in the program with equally humorous presentations were Marie Baconet, Sylvia Lindfors, Lena La Perle, Virginia Garvin, Irene Bartose, Val Stokes, Emma Vach and Larry Fulmer.

Camey Egner became president in 1986 and served until 1993, with the exception of 1989-90. During Camey's presidency, the members were treated to annual catered birthday dinners.

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On Feb. 24, 1987, Mary Lou Byerly's production of Birthday Extravaganza was presented to the delight of all. Twelve members were selected to represent a month of the year. Each was given the option of representing her assigned month in any way she wished.

Mary Lou Byerly was the narrator and was Uncle Sam. Irene Bartose represented January as Baby New Year. Valentine Stokes dressed in a white dress with red hearts represented February. Marie Von Statina in kelly green represented March. Doris Sullivan, in raincoat and umbrella, suggested those April showers. Lorraine Neimi was dressed as the Queen of May. Representing June was Elizabeth Panos singing an adaptation of "Making Whoopee." She was dressed as a very pregnant bride. Representing July was Ruth Hughes dressed as Miss Liberty. Vi Waterhouse was dressed in a 1900 bikini for August. Emma Vach dressed as a 16-year-old ready for school, represented September. Lena LaPerle, with a clown outfit, was prepared for Hallowe'en for the month of October. Becky Ledger was dressed as the Pilgrim mother ready for the first Thanksgiving in November. Sylvia Lindfors, dressed as Santa's elf, represented December.

The twentieth anniversary of the Lakeside Poincianas was celebrated in great style; first of all, on Jan. 24, 1989, with another memorable production by Mary Lou Byerly. She was the author and narrator of a summary of the activities and accomplishments of the organization starting with the organizers in 1969.

On March 28, 1989, the members were treated to a catered banquet with all surviving presidents present and given special recognition.

Anna May Shideler became president in the fall of 1989. In November we had a Thanksgiving pot luck supper, which included husbands.

In February, Mary Lou Byerly once more entertained us royally with a special program of members' home states. As always, Dorothy Wolner's piano accompaniment was an important part.

Representing Ohio were Mary Lou Byerly, Kathryn Decker, Sylvia Lindfors, Vi Waterhouse and Lillian Finch.

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Other states were represented as follows:

Pennsylvania by Margaret Cray.

New Jersey by Bee Kelleher.

Kentucky by Sally Prather, Lorraine Neimi, Penny Cosby and Sylvia Lindfors.

Illinois by Doris Truelaen (Val Stokes' daughter.)

Missouri by Elizabeth Panos.

On March 23, 1993, Margaret Cray was elected president..
At her first meeting on October 26, Joanne Purdy presented a fashion show with six members.

On November 5, the Poincianas were hosts to all the Lakeside residents to a pot luck supper in the clubhouse. The refreshment tables were laden with a great variety of delicious foods. The offerings were so plentiful it was necessary to have a separate table for both the salads and the desserts. Extra tables had to be set up to accommodate all the guests. The dinner was such a success it will be repeated later in the season.

On December 22, the candlelight Christmas Carol Sing-along for all residents was led by vocalist Florence Epiney and pianist Dot Wolner. It was a real "fun" party in the beautifully decorated clubhouse, where, with a great "Ho-Ho-Ho," Santa arrived with a gift for everyone.

The annual brunch consisting of Val's omelette (see below), coffee cake and coffee was held on January 15. The hour of pleasant fellowship was enjoyed by 137 residents of the complex.

There are a number of other special events scheduled. There will be a card party and luncheon on Feb. 12, and there will be two more pot luck dinners; one on Feb. 4, and another on March 4.

Our regular February meeting will be very special. Val Stokes, who has been a big part of the Poincianas for many years, will be there. The program will be a dance medley with Val's daughter, granddaughter and great-granddaughter and grandsons performing .

VAL'S OMELETTE

Four tablespoons melted butter or margarine
Twelve eggs
One half teaspoon white pepper
One 12 oz. can evaporated milk

Using a 9x13 pan, well greased, layer bottom of pan with ham and parsley.

Beat eggs well adding melted butter or margarine while beating. Then add evaporated milk. Pour this over the mixture in the greased 9x13 pan and bake in a well preheated oven at 350 degrees for thirty minutes.

Place pan in center of oven so that the mixture in the bottom of the pan will rise, giving the appearance of a decorated cake and will not burn.

A summary of the first twenty five years of the Poinciana Women's Club was given to members in 1994. The following is a summary of the next fifteen years.

The first annual brunch was started in 1982 in the fall. It was eventually moved to January and continued until 2002. Among the individual chairpersons of this money-making event were Vi Waterhouse, Marian Ream, Janet Donelson and Fern Bessette.

During Margaret Cray's second year as president, members and guests were treated to a most interesting book review by Rose Cooper from West Palm Beach of THE HEIRESS, the biography of Marjorie Merriweather Post, who designed and built the Maralago estate in Palm Beach, now owned by Donald Trump. Our own Daisy Knight was a nurse employed by Marjorie.

In February, a successful Valentine Luncheon was held with Carol Christman as chairperson. For entertainment, Denise's Clothes Corners brought in racks of clothes and presented a style show with five of our ladies as models. Not only was there a profit from the luncheon, but also from the sale of the clothes.

The clothes from Denise's Clothes Corners proved to be so popular that the traveling store was invited back for the following four years.

On February 28, 1995, the business meeting was dispensed with and the musical spoof of SLEEPING BEAUTY was presented with an attendance of 147. Special guest stars were Dave Smith and Harold Turner. What good sports!!! Dorothy Wolner was the pianist and Margaret Vercoe wrote and directed the skit.

In April, a successful pool party was hosted by Margo Iannopollo.

From 1995 to 1997, Margaret Vercoe and Doris Truelsen served as co-presidents. The traditional pattern of events took place with a variety of programs with the exception of the October meeting. In 1995, the October meeting for members was changed to a Halloween potluck because so many members had not yet returned earlier.

In January a special tribute was given to past presidents and a memory singalong took place led by Suzie Furl and Jerry Clark.

In February 1996 the musical play, CINDERELLA, was presented to a record attendance of 158. Anita Messer had the leading role. Twenty ladies participated with cameo performances by Harold Turner and Dave Smith (as the prince and the king respectively) Lilly and Jerry Clark contributed to the humor, dressed as cows singing MOO-OON OVER MIAMI.

In November 1996, an update on landscaping was given to members. They voted to give \$1000 for the project.

At the January meeting, members and guests were treated to special entertainment by two members of the Second Time Around Band, Freddie Bush at the keyboard and John Polvin with his saxophone. To the delight of the membership, Freddie Bush was able to return with other musicians. It was at one of these later occasions that Margaret spotted Vivien & Roger Dennerll dancing!!! They soon became important members of the Poinciana Players!!

Potluck dinners became an annual event for January. Dee Bartose was the capable chairman for many of these.

In February 1997, OUR FAIR LADIES was presented with a record attendance of 180. Our version was the story of a group of homeless ladies who are trained to become elegant socialites. Many of the costumes were the result of enjoyable trips to thrift shops. Highlights of the show were solos by Suzie Furl, Janet Donelson and Jerry Clark---and dances by Doris Truelsen, The pianist was Marion Guazzoni and Margaret Vercoe, the director.

In March 1997 Mary Ann D'Agostino and Doris Truelsen were elected co-presidents and served until 1999, with the traditional events taking place.

At the January 1998 meeting special recognition was given to the following past presidents: Marie VonStetina, Dorothy Wolner, Anna Mae Petrozelli, Margaret Cray and Margaret Vercoe.

While president, Mary Ann was responsible for the government sponsored Safe Driving class, open to the complex and free for Women's Club members.

On February 24 and 25, 1998 ANNIE'S AUNTIE MAME was presented with Janet Donelson and Suzie Furl in the leads to a large appreciative audience. Marion Guazzoni and Margaret Vercoe were pianist and director, respectively.

On February 26, 1999 at 1:00 and 7:30 PM, a variety show entitled FUN AND FROLIC---REMEMBERING WHEN was presented to large appreciative audiences. For this presentation the audience was moved 90 degrees to sit in front of the wall by the pool. This setup has proven to be most workable, both for performers and audience.

In March 1999, Suzie Furl was elected president and Janet Donelson, vice president.

At the annual Valentine Luncheon in February 2000 Carol Christman was the capable chairperson. Men servers really made a hit with their tuxedo t-shirts. A jewelry store from Shoppers Depot presented a large display of costume jewelry, which was for sale.

At the February meeting a group of Finnish dancers presented a delightful program, complete with costumes and refreshments. Attending were twenty-one dancers and thirty-five members.

On February 25, 2000 at 2 and 7:30, the CENTURY CELEBRATION was presented with sixty attending in the afternoon and seventy-two at night. Admission was \$2.00. Refreshments were served,

In February 2001, the Poinciana Players presented its special version of HELLO, DOLLY with Suzie Furl as "Dolly". Fifty-six were present in the afternoon and eighty-five in the evening.

In March 2001, after receiving special permission from the Council, Suzie Furl and Janet Donelson hosted a most successful pool party with the theme of an Hawaiian Luau. One hundred and thirty were served dinner. Luminaries were placed on the edge of the pool, with strings of lights adorning the pool fence. Members of all buildings contributed to the many necessary preparations of food, beverages, decorations and preparation of the pool area. Most enjoyable entertainment was provided by Jerry Clark and Rondo, who sang. Doris Truelsen, Irene Grimes and Tess Hartle danced the hula and delighted the audience.

In February 2002 a group of members and guests took a bus trip to Clewiston to view the sugar factories and enjoy a buffet at the Inn.

Also in February the Poinciana Players presented REMEMBERING SOUTH PACIFIC with Suzie Furl and Roger Dennerll in the leads. Attending were sixty-four in the afternoon and seventy-four in the evening.

In March 2002 another successful pool party was held with a Western theme, hosted by Suzie Furl and Janet Donelson. As for all the pool parties, members from all buildings were helpful in preparing this major project.

At the December 2002 meeting, the Lake Worth Christian School Chorale presented a delightful music program. Forty members and guests attended.

In February 2003, the Poinciana Players presented AROUND THE WORLD IN 80 MINUTES? with Roger Dennerll in the leading role. Seventy-four attended in the afternoon and sixty-four in the evening, besides some children. Especially memorable were Janet Donelson who became Queen Victoria, and the "train ride" across the US, with special effects on the keyboard by Marion Guazzoni.

In March 2003, once again a successful pool party was held, this time with an Italian theme. The special entertainment, Big Band music, was supplied by Bobby Barnett with his saxophone and Freddie Bush at the keyboard. One hundred and twenty-five were served a spaghetti dinner.

Also in March, Suzie Furl, Janet Donelson and Theresa Jacques were reelected officers and Rose Mary Bennett was elected secretary. At that meeting, the decision was made to eliminate the Christmas Open House in 2003 because of poor attendance. That December, after a short business meeting, a Christmas musical program was presented by members.

There were no January and February members' meetings in 2004, but the board meetings continued.

In February, a "Birthday" luncheon was held with Emma Bereza, chairperson of food, and Suzie Furl, decorations. Paul Davis entertained us at the piano.

Also in February, OUR MUSIC MAN was presented to two appreciative audiences with Roger and Vivien Dennerll becoming the leading characters. Peggy and Tom Prather joined the group with Peggy serving as musical director and accompanist.

In March, Suzie and Janet once again hosted a successful pool party with a Las Vegas theme. Eddie Michael provided most enjoyable entertainment.

In October 2004, events started for the season with the traditional and successful Halloween potluck, hosted by Theresa Jacques, and continued with the November members' meeting. A musical TRIBUTE TO WALT DISNEY was the program for members and guests.

On December 5, a combination Christmas Open House and program took place. Also, a bake sale by the Craft Club was held. Deserving special recognition in the program were Janet Donelson with her rendition of THE NIGHT BEFORE CHRISTMAS, Suzie Furl singing O LITTLE TOWN OF BETHLEHEM, Carol Christman and Jerry Clark singing WHITE CHRISTMAS, Brock Sharpe singing THE CHRISTMAS SONG and a visit from Santa and Mrs. Santa (Leo Bereza & Marilyn Booth)

There were no members' meetings December January and February. The board meetings continued every month.

The January potluck and the ladies' spring luncheon took place as usual.

In February, the Poinciana Players presented THE SHAPE OF A YEAR. Especially memorable were Maurice Vercoe's memorized Gettysburg Address, Marian Ream's "bikini" presentations and Beverly Hartman's rendition of SANTA BABY.

In March 2005, once more a successful pool party was held with the theme, AMERICANA, hosted by Suzie. A delicious ham dinner was prepared by the Viscontis, Rose Mary Bennett, Peggy Sokoll and many helpers. Joel Harris (aka Elvis) entertained for an hour and a half to a delighted audience. (He was better than Elvis!!) Sadly, Suzie was ill that evening and unable to attend.

In late October 2005, Hurricane Wilma attacked, causing a major power outage for 13 days, and forced the cancellation of the usual Halloween potluck and November program. Normality was resumed and celebrated by November 16 when Theresa Jacques hosted a most appreciated and successful Harvest Potluck.

The Christmas Open House, the January potluck and ladies' spring MAD HATTER'S luncheon took place.

Also in February the Poinciana Players presented CAMELOT CAPERS (or HAM-A-LOT) to two appreciative audiences. Vivien and Roger Dennerll did indeed become Queen Guinevere and King Arthur.

In March 2006 an Irish potluck supper, hosted by Suzie and Janet, replaced the usual pool party with a full house. The entertainment was supplied by a ladies' barbershop quartet led by Pat Flynn of Building 5.

Established, traditional events took place in 2006-2007 season. The most popular were the ladies' spring luncheon (with a circus theme & a clown!); the show, AN IRISH COUNTRY FAIR, featuring newcomer, Charlie List's Irish humor and Gail Sharpe's artistic backdrops; and the annual pool party with a Mardi Gras theme.

The 2008-2009 season started once more with a successful Halloween potluck, followed by a November 18 program of FIDDLER ON THE ROOF. Sadly, a few weeks after singing the FIDDLER song, Jerry Clark passed away. He had participated in every show since 1996. He is greatly missed.

In December a festive Christmas Open House took place, hosted by Suzie Furl and Building 12 and, later in the month, Christmas caroling was hosted by Beverly Hartman,

On January 17, a successful International Potluck was held with a record attendance, hosted by chairperson, Janet Donelson, with Buildings 7 and 8. Entertainment of music for listening and dancing was supplied by Carla Ormsby.

On February 7, a very special ladies' "Cherry Blossom Luncheon" took place, hosted by Charline List, with a most delicious meal and festive Oriental decorations. Roger and Vivien Dennerll delighted their audience with anecdotes of their recent trip to

China. Charlie List and Jim Carreau were the costumed greeters and men servers wore the tuxedo t- shirts.

The Poinciana Players presented OKLAHOMA'S OKAY on February 27 to two appreciative audiences. Refreshments were served by Buildings 6 and 14.

As this history summary is being prepared, plans are in progress for a fortieth anniversary celebration to be held at the clubhouse and poolside. The meal will be catered and Carla Ormsby has been hired to entertain. Past presidents, Camey Egner, Margaret Vercoe and Suzie Furl will be honored. Charline List and Pat Flynn are rehearsing with Peggy Prather, as accompanist, to sing the following:
